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# NORDIC BRIDGES 2022

Collaboration. Storytelling. Action. A year-long celebration throughout Canada of art, culture and ideas from across the Nordic Region

November 2, 2021 || Toronto, ON || Nordic Bridges, a national initiative led by Harbourfront Centre in Toronto and supported by the Nordic Council of Ministers, will connect hundreds of creators from Canada and the Nordic Region throughout 2022 in a year-long exchange of art, culture, and ideas. With key programming pillars of artistic innovation, accessibility and inclusion, Indigenous perspectives, and resilience and sustainability, Nordic Bridges aims to inspire artists and audiences from coast to coast to coast. From January to December, the initiative will spark dialogue between Canadian audiences and artists while highlighting Nordic innovation. Programming includes performing arts (dance, theatre, and music), visual and digital arts, craft and design, literature, and film. Nordic artists will collaborate with and perform alongside Canadian artists at both established and new festivals and events across the country.

Nordic Bridges also includes the new Nordic–Canadian Fellowship in Environmental Journalism for emerging writers, and a year-long series of Nordic Talks, a platform for dialogue connecting Nordic and Canadian artists, thinkers, youth leaders, innovators and policy-makers. **Visit NordicBridges.ca** for more details.

Nordic Bridges connects the Nordic Region – Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway, Sweden, the Faroe Islands, Greenland and Åland – and Canada. This is the largest and most ambitious of recent Nordic culture initiatives in scope: previous programs include Nordic Cool at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, DC (2013) and Nordic Matters at Southbank Centre in London, England (2017).

Each programming partner will host Canadian and Nordic artistic collaborators during this year-long series of Nordic spotlights. Nordic Bridges programming includes World Premieres, North American and Canadian Premieres, and dozens of innovative, multidisciplinary experiences to explore.

# THE ART

**Nordic Bridges** programming spans the country, and details will be updated throughout 2022. Confirmed Nordic spotlights:

- NORDIC LIGHTS, a free, outdoor series of light installations opens at Harbourfront Centre (Toronto) on January 20, 2022, and invites Canadians to discover the best of Nordic contemporary light art this winter. This world premiere from the team behind groundbreaking Norwegian light festival FJORD OSLO is a unique immersive collaboration by leading visual artists, and lighting and video designers from Canada, Norway, Sweden, Finland, and Denmark, and is co-produced by Fjord Studio.
- The Toronto International Film Festival<sup>®</sup> will celebrate the best of Nordic cinema and filmmakers in a year-long series presented by TIFF Cinematheque. The celebration launches in January 2022 with a selection of films by acclaimed Swedish director Roy Andersson (A Swedish Love Story, Songs from the Second Floor). SONGS FROM THE SECOND FLOOR: THE FILMS OF ROY ANDERSSON is the first of three series that TIFF Cinematheque will showcase in 2022, in Toronto. The retrospective will also stop at the Winnipeg Cinematheque, The Cinematheque in Vancouver and La Cinémathèque québécoise in Montreal. TIFF's year-long program will highlight filmmakers from seven Nordic countries, celebrate women in film and feature Nordic film noirs for in-cinema screenings at TIFF Bell Lightbox (Toronto). As part of

its mandate to preserve film heritage, provide critical context for film and video art, and present classic and contemporary films from around the world, audiences can also look forward to seeing works from renowned directors including **Lone Scherfig (Denmark), Iram Haq (Norway), Pirjo Honkasalo (Finland)**, and **Amanda Kernell (Sweden)**.

- SHARED TERRAIN, curated by DesignTO at the annual DesignTO Festival (Toronto; January 21 to March 20, 2022), is a free, group art exhibition fostering collaboration between five Canadian and five Nordic artists and designers. Working together over three months, each pair of creatives will work remotely on a collaborative piece generated through conversations. Artists include: Wednesday Architecture (Denmark), Teemu Salonen (Finland), Randi Samsonsen (Faroe Islands), Katarina Spik Skum (Sweden), Lillian Tørlen (Norway), Carissa Baktay (Iceland/Canada), and Anie Toole, Boris Yu, Justine Woods, and Laura Millard of Canada.
- The North American Premiere tour of **STORY**, **STORY**, **DIE**. from **Norway's Alan Lucien Øyen** and his company **winter guests** brings award-winning contemporary Nordic stage work to Canada. Drawing from real-life experiences, Øyen's innovative multi-disciplinary dance and theatre works have gained critical acclaim and an international following. *Story*, *story*, *die.*, Øyen's latest work for seven international dancers, uses a striking cinematic structure to dig deep into questions of self-identity and the relationship between lies and love. In February 2022, it will be presented at the **National Arts Centre** (Ottawa), with tour stops in Toronto, Montreal, Calgary and Vancouver.
- The Dancers of Damelahamid (BC) produce the annual Coastal Dance Festival (CDF) in Vancouver each March, celebrating the stories, songs and dances of the Indigenous peoples of the Northwest Coast with guest national and international artists. It is the only festival in the greater Vancouver area focused on the professional presentation of contemporary expressions of Coastal Indigenous dance. As part of Nordic Bridges and its focus on Indigenous perspectives, the festival has programmed riveting new work from Sami artists Stina Lorås with Johan Sara, Sara Marielle Gaup with OZAS, and Liv Aira with Marika Renhuvud.
- In October 2013, Nova Scotia choral director Scott Jones was stabbed in the back and had his throat cut in a homophobic attack that left him paralyzed from the waist down. In the following days his story garnered international attention, not only for its brutality, but also for Scott's uncommonly early path to forgiveness. I FORGIVE YOU, a world premiere theatre production from Newfoundland's Artistic Fraud, will debut as part of Nordic Bridges in 2022. Based on this true story and written by Scott Jones and Robert Chafe, I Forgive You features an original score by Ingi Garðar Erlendsson of Iceland's Sigur Rós.
   \* I Forgive You is being developed with the assistance of the National Arts Centre's National Creation Fund, Canada Council for the Arts, Arts NL, the City of St. John's, Nordic Bridges, and Canadian Stage.

- Many Nordic communities recognize sign languages as a basic human right by law, a stark difference to the realities in Canada. As part of Nordic Bridges, Deaf theatre artists from Sweden, led by Debbie Rennie, will mentor the core-creative team for CAUSTIC EFFECT, a new opera work-in-progress by Monique Holt (Librettist & Director) and Landon Krentz (Artistic Director & Performer) in a partnership between Inside Out Theatre (AB) and re:Naissance Opera (BC). The production explores how language is seen, heard, and understood by combining music and the movement, rhythmic structure, and meter present in Visual Gestural Communication (VGC). Early excerpts from *Caustic Effect* will be streamed in September with more details to come. This Nordic Bridges mentorship will be a combination of online sessions and an in-person series of performance masterclasses providing much-needed theatre training access to Deaf artists in Canada.
- The Yukon Arts Centre (Whitehorse, YT) will host the only Canadian stop for ARCTIC HIGHWAYS, a collaborative, Indigenous, immersive touring visual art exhibition (September to November 2022). Arctic Highways invites viewers to explore what it means to be unbounded, spiritually and geographically, as told through contemporary Indigenous art works. It is a borderless journey across Northern Indigenous lands, cultures, and traditions with a shared history and a common future. Curated by Sami artists, the exhibit also includes work by Maureen Gruben, an Inuvialuk artist based in Tuktoyaktuk, NT, Meryl McMaster, a Canadian artist with nêhiyaw (Plains Cree), British, and Dutch ancestry, based in Ottawa, ON, and Sonya Kelliher-Combs, an Alaskan artist based in Anchorage, AK of Iñupiaq and Athabascan descent. The curators and artists include Marja Helander and Matti Aikio (Finland); Dan Jåma, Gunvor Guttorm and Máret Ánne Sara (Norway); and Britta Marakatta Labba, Laila Susanne Kuhmunen, Olof Marsja, and Tomas Colbengtson (Sweden).

\* Arctic Highways will also show in Washington DC, New York, Minneapolis, Chicago, Seattle and Snåsa in Norway before returning to Granö, Sweden in 2025. The exhibition is produced and financed by Mötesplats Granö and its founder Jan Wejdmark.

- NORDIC NOIR will be a spotlight of the Toronto International Festival of Authors' inaugural Crime & Mystery Writing Festival (Harbourfront Centre; June 3–5 2022), and TIFA's fall festival (September 22 – October 2, 2022). Participating Nordic masters of suspense will include best-selling authors from across the region.
- Throughout 2022, artists of all genres from each Nordic Region will be presented across
   Harbourfront Centre's programming. Early announcements include a solo exhibition of artist
   and graphic designer Liv Aurora Jensen alias Liss Stender (Greenland), and singer songwriter Julia Clara (Åland) who will be part of a summer-long Nordic music spotlight at
   Harbourfront Centre. Partnership and performance details will be released in the coming
   months.

# The Nordic–Canadian Fellowship in Environmental Journalism

### (June 2021 – October 2022)

There has never been a more urgent time to document how climate change affects communities, culture, and our planet. Recognizing the need to foster and encourage young voices, Nordic Bridges has created a fulsome journalism fellowship for ages 18–25 to promote best practices and fact-based reporting.

The 18-month fellowship offers the opportunity for 16 emerging journalists (eight Nordic and eight Canadian) to conduct reporting trips and contribute to an exhibition focusing on the current climate crisis. As part of Nordic Bridges, the fellowship also includes mentorships with experienced journalists and bootcamps featuring keynote speakers and panelists from Canada and the Nordic Region.
